Report from New York: The Manufacturers Hanover Corporate Challenge Finals

The Caltech/JPL womens team finished "out of the money" but did admirably against some very tough competition in the Mani Hani 3.5-mile final. which was run on Park Avenue in the rain on November 20. Team members Kathy Kanes, Shenda Baker, and Bonnie Theberge ran essentially the same times that they ran in the qualifying race in September--a feat in itself given the conditions. The race was run during a downpour and water was well above ankle deep during parts of the race. While the final results are not out yet, it appears that the Caltech/JPL team placed fourth. The British men's and women's teams easily ran away with the race--not only did they place first in their divisions, but the men had the first, second, and fourth place finishers, and the winner of the women's race was from the British team (she's won the race three years in a row). Kathy Kanes put in a good effort to catch her, but came in second just eight seconds behind. Kathy had set her sightes on the DooDah 5k, which was held a week after Mani Hani, and thus she trained through the Mani Hani race and was not at her peak. This strategy later paid off for

her, since she won the DooDah race and a trip to New Zealand (there were no prizes involved in the Mani Hani race).

The real reward of the Mani Hani race was simply making it to the finals. In addition to an all-expense-paid trip to New York, the finalists, team captains, and their guests were wined and dined lavishly, including dinner atop the World Trade Center, a tour of the city, a night at a disco, and the chance to hobnob with Grete Waitz, Eammon Caughlin, Fred Lebow, and a multitude of young, thin, energetic people from several continents. It was a very special weekend. Training on the streets of New York is an unforgettable experience. If you're ever in New York City, don't miss a run over the Brooklyn Bridge.
